M: Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

The student will be expected to demonstrate proficiency in French at the advanced level in:

- 1. Reading comprehension of complex, unedited, literary and non-literary writings, including complete works.
- 2. Oral expression: defending a point of view, discussing abstract topics.
- 3. Written expression: summaries, narratives, descriptions, expressing an opinion.

## N: Course Content

- 1. In-depth review of grammatical structures.
- 2. Study of vocabulary and stylistic nuances.
- 3. Culture through the works of Francophone writers.

**O:** Methods of Instruction

Class activities include: small group practice of syntactic and lexical structures studied at home, discussion of readings, debates, listening comprehension (tapes, films, slides), discussion and correction of written works and oral presentations.

Conversation practice in small groups with a Native Language Assistant.
