0:	Methods of Instruction [Learning Process]					
	Participants learn about professional nursing practice, critical thinking, and critical reflection. Participants having identified an area of focus, propose practice goals, experiences, and placements. They work in increasingly independent roles as active practitioners in a variety of nursing contexts. They work in collaboration with experienced practitioners who act as role models and preceptors. Praxis involves examination of the dynamic interplay between theory and practice. Praxis is actualized by critical reflection journaling, and active participation in nursing practice seminars. Faculty function as consultants, helping participants in the development and integration of their practice.
